## Vocabulaire :

math, english, history, PE, science, ICT, geography, music, french, arts, morning, afternoon

Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, Sunday

## Structures syntaxiques :

Do you have math on [day] morning?

Yes, I do / No, I don't.

Does he-she have english on [day] afternoon?

Yes, he-she does/No, he-she doesn't.

## Grammaire :

Si la question commence par "Do you...?",  
la réponse est "Yes, I do/No, I don't."

Si la question commence par "Does he-she...?",  
la réponse est "Yes, he-she does/No, he-she doesn't."

## Socio-culturel :
